1. Maintaining Health and Safety

A. Universal and correct wearing of masks: Masks were made optional for students and staff inside the school buildings of the district. In addition, based on CDC review of the federal mandate for mask-wearing on school buses, students would no longer be required to wear masks on any school bus, as of the same date, March 7th, 2022.

The Superintendent reminded families that the determination to wear or not wear a mask in school has to be each family's personal decision. The Superintendent emphasizes that based on the school's HIB (Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying) policy, there would be **No Tolerance** for any instance in which a student is harassed or intimidated as a result of wearing or not wearing a mask.

B. Vaccinations - Based on New CDC Guidelines:

Schools, ECE programs, and [health departments](#) should promote equitable access to vaccination. Staying up to date on [routine vaccinations](#) is essential to prevent illness from many different infections. South Harrison Township School District will:

- Provide information about [COVID-19 vaccines](#) and other recommended [vaccines](#).
- Ensure communication meets the needs of people with limited English proficiency who require language services and individuals with disabilities who require accessible formats through translation services.
- Encourage [trust and confidence](#) in COVID-19 vaccines.

C. Physical distancing (e.g., including use of cohorts/podding):

During periods of high community transmission, South Harrison schools will identify opportunities to maximize physical distancing for the following

higher-risk scenarios,

- In common areas, in spaces where students may gather such as hallways and auditoriums.
- During indoor activities when increased exhalation occurs, such as singing, shouting, band practice, sports, or exercise
- Encourage students and staff to stay home when sick

D. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette: Students will be reminded of proper handwashing procedures. Classrooms will continue to have hand sanitizer available when hand washing is not possible or in classrooms that do not have a sink.

E. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation: All indoor facilities have adequate ventilation. Filter(s) for A/C units have been maintained (and will continue to be) and changed according to manufacturer recommendations. A schedule for increased routine cleaning and disinfection has been developed and followed and will continue. There will be routine cleaning and disinfecting of surfaces and objects that are frequently touched. This may include cleaning objects/surfaces not ordinarily cleaned daily (e.g. doorknobs, light switches, classroom sink handles, countertops). Custodians will use all cleaning products according to the directions on the label. (For disinfection, most common EPA-registered household disinfectants should be effective. A list of products that are EPA-approved for use against the virus that causes COVID-19 is available on the EPA's website.) Bathrooms will be sanitized daily, or between use, as much as possible, using protocols outlined by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

F. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments: South Harrison schools will continue to follow the CDC and NJDOH guidelines/timeframes for quarantine and/or isolation which currently includes:

Quarantine is no longer recommended for people who are exposed to COVID-19 except in certain high-risk congregate settings such as correctional facilities, homeless shelters, and nursing homes. In school settings, which are generally not considered high-risk congregate settings, people who were exposed to COVID-19 should follow [recommendations](#) to wear a well-fitting mask and get tested. K-12 schools can decide how to manage exposures based on the local context and the benefits of preserving access to in-person learning. Accommodations may be necessary for exposed people who cannot wear a mask or have difficulty wearing a well-fitting mask. Schools and ECE programs can also consider recommending masking and/or testing for a classroom in which a student was recently exposed who is unable to consistently and correctly wear a mask.

G. Diagnostic and screening testing - South Harrison schools will no longer require screening tools, as per the CDC guidelines for schools.

H. Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible - Provide information about [COVID-19 vaccines](#) and other recommended [vaccines](#). J. Meals We will discourage students from sharing meals and complete routine cleaning between groups. Frequently touched surfaces will be cleaned. Surfaces that come in contact with food will be washed, rinsed, and sanitized before and after meals.

2. Ensuring Continuity of Services

We will continue our Intervention Program and provide Virtual Summer School and Extended School Year. Our SEL programs will continue to support students with mental health needs in addition to a counselor who will provide students with SEL support. We will maintain a nurse in the district. The district has provided Chromebooks for all students in grades K through 6 to ensure that each student has his/her own device to use at home and school. We will continue working with families with technical support and to identify those who do not have access to the internet in their household.
